## Reading

17 Jack is doing all of the things that babies his age are supposed to be doing. He  
35 is curious and likes to explore his world. Most of what he gets a hold of goes into  
his mouth.

37 Jack is ten months old. He crawls quickly and pulls himself up on furniture.  
51 As soon as Jack starts walking, it will be even easier for him to get into things that  
69 may not be safe.

73 Beth has worked hard at baby proofing her home. She wants her son to be safe  
89 and thrive. She has placed all breakable items on high shelves and covered all the  
104 electrical outlets. Jack could get a serious shock or start a fire by putting objects in  
120 the outlets.

122 All of Beth's cleaning supplies are in high cupboards. Why? Glass cleaner and  
135 blue Kool-Aid look very similar. The family's medications and vitamins are in a  
148 locked cabinet. Colorful pills could easily be mistaken for candy.

158 Beth feels good about the safety of her home, but knows she must still keep a  
174 watchful eye on Jack. As his parent, she is his best safety monitor. Beth has often  
190 thought how nice it would be to have eyes on both the front and back of her head!
